About the Day Centre Resources Hub

Why was it developed?

A survey found that day centres felt unsupported and underprepared for current and future environments, that evidence and information about day centres would be welcomed by day centre providers, professional decision-makers and community groups, and that there is an appetite for joint working.

How was it developed?

We identified resource needs by speaking to people from day centres and people in a variety of roles. Researchers and a group of day centre providers, other professionals and people interested in day centres prioritised, identified, assembled, and developed resources that aimed to meet the needs expressed and were identified as priorities.

Resources were tested by a set of day centres and professionals and their feedback used to refine them

How does it work?

The Hub includes compilations of useful material and provides some Word or Excel templates that can be downloaded and used locally. We hope people will dip in to find specific resources relevant to their work and their needs. Downloadable pdfs containing additional information are also available.

How was it funded?

It was funded by the National Institute for Health and Care Research Applied Research Collaboration (NIHR ARC) South London and developed by social care researchers based at the NIHR Policy Research Unit in Health and Social Care Workforce, King's College London.
