Xinran Xue is a British–Chinese author, journalist and activist, known for her ground-breaking work in documenting the hidden stories of Chinese people. Her first book, The Good Women of China, was published in 2002 and became an international bestseller. Her most recent book The Promise was shortlisted for the Society of Authors Translation Prize. In August 2004 Xinran set up 'The Mothers' Bridge of Love' (MBL), to help bridge the huge poverty gap that still exists in many parts of China.



Yizhe Daniel Xie is a portfolio strategist/economist and a non-resident fellow at the Centre for China Globalization (CCG). His career spans several prominent institutions across Asia and Europe, including including SPX Capital in London, the ADB Institute in Tokyo, Goldman Sachs in Beijing, and IBK Securities in Seoul. He has also held visiting positions at think tanks in the US, India, Indonesia, and the Philippines.



Jan Knoerich is Reader in China and the Global Political Economy at the Lau China Institute, School of Global Affairs, King's College London. He lectures on the Chinese economy and Chinese international investments, and his research focuses on the business, political economy and development dimensions of Chinese international investments and financial internationalisation. Dr Knoerich's work has appeared in leading academic journals, such as New Political Economy, the Journal of World Business, and the China Quarterly.
