



Welcome to the New Hunt's House Library

The New Hunt's House Library is on the Guy's Campus.

Once you find the building, the library entrance is on the first (1) floor.

To gain access to the building, you will need your King's ID card.

On your left as you enter the library, there is the so-called Library Information Point.



Library staff on the Library Information Point and in between the shelves can be recognised by their purple lanyards or purple shirts.

The shirts and the lanyards have the King's logo on them and clearly say: "Libraries & Collections".



- Please keep any conversations brief and lowvolume (whispering level), including no talking on your phone.
- You can consume lidded drinks and cold food.



- No talking in silent areas (including on your phone) and you should keep other noise to a minimum
- Please move to another zone if you need to talk, eat or undertake other tasks that may impact others' opportunity to study in silence.
- You can consume lidded drinks only, no food permitted.

Find your Zone

There are three (3) different types of zone in all our libraries.

They are colour-coded and marked with symbols on the <u>Floor Plans</u> as well as on the walls inside the libraries.

Choose a zone that suits your study needs and be mindful of others studying around you.



- You can consume lidded drinks and cold food.




The New Hunt's House Library is spread across two (2) floors.

The library hosts a variety of study spaces.

It has:

- computer rooms 📃
- group study rooms
- a video call pod () and
- postgraduate study rooms



There are many study places and reading spots throughout the library.

The second (2) floor at the New Hunt's House Library has the most study places and reading spots.

They can suit all study styles and we encourage you to try them all out.



That way you can find what works best for you.








The New Hunt's House Library has more than one computer room you can use \square .

To use a free computer, you just need your King's login details (i.e. K1234567 + your password).

You can find an available PC using the <u>PC-free</u> system.

You can also borrow a laptop from us. 💻

To borrow a laptop, use your King's ID card at the laptop loan cabinets across from the Library Information Point.



In the library space, you can also find so-called Plug & Play Screens.

They allow you to connect your own device for extra screen space.

Plug the USB-C cable provided into your device as shown to use the desk's monitor, keyboard, and mouse.





The New Hunt's House Library has sixteen (16) group study rooms to use.

They are all clearly marked with the group study room symbol.

You can <u>book them online</u> using our so-called LibCal (Library Calendar) system.







Only Postgraduate students (students that have finished an undergraduate degree) are allowed to use the postgraduate study rooms and the second (2) floor of the New Hunt's House Library.

We call them 'Postgraduate Zones' and they are clearly marked with the postgraduate symbol.





To find a book, use the so-called Library Search PCs next to the wall near the book stacks.

The area is marked with the words: 'Library Catalogue'.


Once you have found your book on the Library Search PC, note down its classmark and location. A classmark is a code made up of letters and numbers we have given all the books to decide which book goes where. They look like this: PN1995.F748 HUS.



Then use the directions on the **<u>floor plans</u>** to get to the book.

Floorplans are attached to the wall next to the Library Search PCs.

A member of the library staff at the Library Information Point can explain this to you more if you need help.



Once you have found the book, use one of the selfservice machines and your King's ID Card in front of the Library Information Point to borrow it.

You will also use one of these machines, when you are returning the book after you have used it.



If you have any IT questions pay a visit to the so-called **Tech Bar** to the right of the Library Information Point.

The IT staff there can assist you with questions about:

- personal printing
- your King's IT account i and
- using IT Services like conference poster printing



There are personal printers in the New Hunt's House Library 📄 .

The printers can print, copy, and scan items to your personal email.

Just send your documents to 'Follow Me Printing' and they will be released from any working printer across King's through use of your King's ID card.

The first time you use a printer you will need to register on it.

To register, use your King's ID card on the printer and enter your King's login details (i.e. K1234567 + your password) when asked. =

King's IT has a <u>quick guide to using the print, copy, scan</u> <u>machines</u>



You can make use of the so-called Chargeboxes at the New Hunt's House Library.

They support most chargers and securely charge your device for free.

Each cabinet has its own key.

Make sure your devices is on silent before you put it in the Chargebox. \searrow



A quick snack or meal for library sessions can be grabbed outside of the library.

Downstairs, on the ground floor of the New Hunt's House building, there is a café and several vending machines.



The Wills Library

If you prefer a quieter space, you can use the socalled Wills Library.

It is open 24/7 and can be found in the Hodgkin Building on the Guy's campus.

The Hodgkin Building is across from the New Hunt's House Library building.



The Wills Library is on the ground floor of the Hodgkin Building and access is only for those holding King's ID cards.

A member of the library staff is happy to give you directions to the Wills Library.





Special Collections and Archives

As well as the main collections we also have a Special Collections Library and Archives. They keep hold of the very expensive and very old items.

The so-called Foyle Special Collections Library is inside the Maughan Library.

The Archives are inside the Strand Building on the Strand.

They hold a unique, very important and growing range of archival and printed sources.
